It is with great pleasure that I would like to introduce Phil Nauta, Organic Gardener's Pantry, as the first profession - al member to be highlighted.

Ingredients For Plants And Soil

The Organic Gardener's Pantry is a new business that supplies organic products to organic gardeners. It was recently started by SOUL certified professional member, Phil Nauta, in Victoria, BC. When operating his previous gardening service in London, Ontario, he found it very challenging to get many of the products that he had learned about through Gaia College's Organic Landscape Management program. Since moving to Victoria last fall, he has met Organic Master Gardeners, Gaia College graduates, and other SOUL members who are also finding it difficult to get these things in Canada.

It didn't take long for Phil to realize that he would enjoy filling this void. If you are an organic gardener, landscaper, farmer, greenskeeper, retailer, or anyone else who works with plants and soils, you can now find organic products at www.gardenerspantry.ca. Separated into the four categories of microorganisms, biostimulants, minerals, and energizers, the website has detailed information about all of the products. While many companies offer a confusing array of so-called "organic" fertilizers that are often unnecessary or even harmful, Phil has assembled a small product list that he feels covers most of the off-site amendments needed to bring soils and ecosystems towards a balance.

In the microorganisms section, several effective microorganisms (EM) and mycorrhizal fungi products represent some of the most important landscape inputs. The biostimulants section offers liquid kelp, liquid fish hydrolysate, and liquid humic and fulvic acids for the many benefits they provide. The minerals section includes a paramagnetic glacial rock dust, a new sea minerals product based on Maynard Murray's research, and several of the important mined mineral sources, such as high calcitic lime and rock phosphate. The newly emerging field of energizers will be expanded in the future as more research is conducted. Phil offers a homeopathic product that is new to Canada, but

has been used around the world for nearly 20 years. It is called Penergetic and it is based on the work of Nikola Tesla and Wilhelm Reich. Most of the products are OMRI Listed, and all are approved for use under the SOUL Standard.

While Phil encourages people to search for products locally to support their community and cut down on the environmental impacts of transportation, many of his products are difficult to find, and also come in small, concentrated forms, so he is happy to ship to anywhere in Canada.

Biosolids, Animal Manure, and Earthworms: Is There a Connection?

A recent study looked at the organic chemicals that animal manure and biosolids leave in the soil, and their accumulation in earthworms. It was found that the earthworms accumulated "soil contaminants" in their bodies and that these chemicals "included the active ingredients commonly found in a variety of household products—including the disinfectants found in antibacterial soaps, fragrances used in perfumes and detergents, and pharmaceuticals."

The experiment was conducted on "a soybean field fertilized with biosolids, a corn field fertilized with swine manure, and a soybean field (control field) that had received no applications of either biosolids or manure for at least 7 years." Earthworms collected from these fields had accumulations of disinfectants, antifoaming agents, flame-retardants, antibiotics, synthetic fragrances and chemicals that bind fragrances in soaps. Surprisingly, in the control field that had nothing added to it for 7 years, the earthworms had less but similar accumulations of chemicals within their bodies. This suggested that the chemicals from biosolids and animal manures persisted in the soil for very long periods (or came from another source) and that earthworms could concentrate chemicals in their bodies that may not have been detectable otherwise.
